How we work

DFMC is farmer-run and farmer-owned, bringing together milk, capital and members to provide better outcomes for dairy farmers and manufacturers.

Our eight-member board consists of seven dairy farmers and one independent director with expertise in finance and business management.

The Ward Representative Advisory Council (WRAC) is a consultative panel made up of 14 DFMC members. They act as a sounding board on policy and strategy to help drive the co-operative forward.

As a co-operative, we use our members' collective milk volume, capital and membership to:

- Manage our members' collective milk supply
- Support dairy farmers' personal and business development
- Provide financial loans to members struck by drought or disaster
- Address the needs and concerns of farmers from all regions

Happy, healthy, productive cows: a triple win for dairying

Happy cows are healthy cows, and healthy cows in turn produce the highest possible calibre of milk, according to Pat, Michelle, Gregory and Erika Quinn.

The Quinns farm just over 1400 hectares at Mincha West, half an hour's drive due south of the Murray River in northern Victoria, with a 500-head mixed Friesian-Jersey milking herd. They signed on as suppliers to DFMC in 2007.

"We chose DFMC predominantly for the security it was offering," says Pat.

Up to 20,000 litres of milk from the Quinn farm is collected every day in peak periods, or every second day when volumes are slightly lower, and trucked by refrigerated tanker to Lion's processing plants in Melbourne or Sydney. Within hours of leaving Mincha West it appears on retail shelves under brand names including Dairy Farmers, Pura, Farmers Union, Big M and Dare.

In their dairy business, the Quinns prioritise animal welfare and caring for the natural environment.

"We also keep a close eye on our own health and on occupational health and safety," Pat says.

Fair milk prices lead to dairy innovation

Monitoring burping cows may not be everyone's idea of a day well spent, but for Victorian dairy farmers Cameron and Ann Hodge knowing how often their cows are ruminating and the status of their fertility through smart cow collars is leading to good outcomes for their business.

Cameron and Ann Hodge have been dairying for 18 years. They run a 450 cow herd -90% Friesian and 10% Jersey - on 260 hectares at Cohuna in Northern Victoria.

For the last nine years, they have been members of DFMC. Cameron is also a director of the co-operative. He attributes the capacity to adopt new technologies such as the collars to their DFMC membership.

"DFMC members in this region — northern Victoria — have typically enjoyed a one or two cent per litre price advantage over competitors in the last few years," says Cameron.

"Having a greater farmgate income has certainly paved the way for new opportunities to be incorporated into our business."

Aside from the collars, the Hodges have been able to adopt or explore a range of other technologies such as the use of sexed semen to reduce the number of bull calves born; ear tags and an in-shed dairy management program that records every detail of every cow; an automated milking parlour requiring only one person to operate it; establishment of over 15 kilometres of tree belts for shade and environmental benefits; automated teat and milk cup sanitation system (reducing mastitis by 50–60%); and one that most dairies now have that is simple but a life-saver — automated drafting gates.
